

3. Second Farm Rule

PRODUCE AND NURSERY may come from a secondary farm when purchased directly from the grower, providing the following conditions are met:

- a) Vendor may have produce and/or nursery from up to 5 Secondary Farms, per produce or nursery vendor, per day.
 - b) A secondary farm may be represented only once at the VFM per day, and only by one vendor.
 - c) It is required that a Second Farm Application be submitted by the produce/nursery vendor prior to the vendor selling the Second Farm produce/nursery. The Second Farm owner must sign a statement indicating his/her approval of the Applicant/Vendor to sell his/her produce at VFM, as well as verifying that those items were grown and/or produced exclusively by the Second Farm, and within the states of Washington or Oregon. The VFM is not an outlet for wholesale produce.
 - d) Both Second Farm and Second Farm produce/nursery must be pre-approved prior to sale at VFM. Approval of Second Farm produce/nursery will be limited, and may be denied or revoked.
 - e) Second Farm produce/nursery is required to have prominent labeling with distinguishable signage. Signage will comply in uniformity with signage standard noted in rule #4. It must include the name of the Second Farm, city and state where it was grown.
4. All agriculture products must be clearly and legibly labeled as to city and state where the product was grown.
 5. The VFM reserves the right to inspect the establishment where items are grown.
 6. Agricultural vendors who wish to offer free edible samples must meet applicable Health Department requirements.
 7. Agricultural vendors who grow their produce on their property and sell at farmers markets in the state of Washington are not required to obtain a Washington State business license for the VFM.
 8. Fresh meat, fish, shellfish, wine, egg, juices/ciders and dairy vendors must be approved and licensed by the appropriate agency. They must sell their products in agency-approved packaging. Questions about wine, honey, wild-gathered foods, fish, shellfish, meats & other exceptions not grown by the Vendor should be directed to the Agriculture Chairperson.
 9. To guard against possible contamination, all produce must be elevated at least 6 inches above the ground or on a pallet.
 10. All pet food/treats must have all required licenses, including WSDA Commercial Feed Registration for each recipe/ingredient, and meet all state and federal labeling and ingredient content requirements. Prior to selling, the vendor must provide a copy of a certificate of insurance to the VFM of not less than \$1,000,000 naming the VFM as additional insured.
 11. Produce vendors must provide leak proof container(s) with lid for waste, and remove the containers at the end of the market day.
 12. All nursery vendors must comply with Washington State requirements regarding Sudden Oak Death inspections and issues.
